Phoenix loves to play with dolls and marvel at pretty fabrics. Most of all, he loves to dance—ballet, powwow, or just swirling and twirling around his house. Sometimes Phoenix gets picked on and he struggles with feeling different, but his mom and brother are proud of him. With his family's help, Phoenix learns about two-spirit/Niizh Manidoowag people in Anishinaabe culture and just how special he is.

Based on the childhood experiences of her son, Phoenix, Marty Wilson-Trudeau demonstrates the difference that a loving and supportive family can make.

We hope you enjoyed your time with Marty and their story! Marty speaks about two-spirit people and living as your authentic self.

Two-spirit is an Indigenous gender identity. Marty speaks about how they were revered and sacred to her people. Phoenix is a two-spirit person and because of this he was treated differently than other kids and people were often mean to him because of what he liked. People were mean to him because he wasn't the same as the other boys in his class, he was different.

Phoenix has both a boy and a girl spirit and that makes him extra special because he can think and feel like both boys and girls, and his community has great respect for two-spirit people like Phoenix. Phoenix learned on his journey that being different was okay, in fact, it was sacred. We are all sacred, in everything that we are.

Phoenix experienced a lot of feelings of being unwelcome or disliked. As a class create a list of things you can do to make people feel welcome in your classroom.
